


Who Killed Christopher Goodman?



The Flume Award promotes teen reading by inviting teens to help select great literature.


Each year, 9th through 12th graders across NH nominate their favorite books and vote on the top 10 in April.




I Have Lost My Way


I Have the Right To (audio)




Dear Martin
