Registered voters in the Town of Warner are needed for this all-volunteer process.
State Primary Election Day is Tuesday, Sept.
8 and the General Election is Tuesday, Nov.
3. Polls close both days at 7 p.m. The time commitment for Sept. 8 is 7 p.m. to approx. 10 p.m., the General Election is expected to have a later conclusion, as more ballots will need to be counted. Please email Kathy Carson at

The Town Clerk's office will be open from 3:00 - 5:00 pm on Monday, Sept. 7th, 2020 (Labor Day) for absentee voting only. Please enter using the side entrance of the building. Masks are required to vote in person in the Town Hall on Sept 8. Other accommodations will be provided to vote if you cannot wear a mask.

Sometimes when browsing the <u>library</u> <u>catalog</u> you find more items than you actually need, but want time to keep looking before you decide. Simply put items being considered in a temporary **Cart**, then select your "keepers" and place a hold on them all with one click. Staff will then check them out to you and contact you.


