COVID-19 Survival on Human Skin


"Wash your hands and don't touch your face"!

A new study evaluated the survival time of Covid 19 and Influenza A (IAV) virus on human skin surfaces. Read the Manuscript here

The study showed that IAV survives around 2 hours, and Covid 19 survives about 9 hours on skin. Good news: the virus is completely inactivated on skin surfaces by 80% ethanol disinfectants in 15 seconds.

"Conclusions: The 9-h survival of SARS-CoV-2 on human skin may increase the risk of contact transmission in comparison with IAV, thus accelerating the pandemic. Proper hand hygiene is important to prevent the spread of SARS-CoV-2 infections."

HALLOWEEN Trick-or-Treating

Statement from Warner PD:

"The CDC has discouraged Trick or Treating during the Covid -19 pandemic. For those who choose to Trick or Treat between 5 pm and 8 pm October 31, we ask that you be safe and responsible:

- Stay home if you are not feeling well.
- Wear a non-costume mask over your nose and mouth when trick-ortreating and handing out treats.
- Avoid large gatherings or parties and find ways to trick-or-treat while staying at least 6 feet away from others, including when handing out and accepting treats.
- Practice frequent hand cleaning bring a bottle of alcohol-based hand sanitizer with you while trick-ortreating, and use it often.

The host will need to give permission to others, to switch who shares their screen. (Thanks Terry Hathaway for the tip idea.)


Not sure how to do it all? No worries, you will all laugh a lot as you learn together! Or ask us for a free tutorial!

You can also share photos, just like an old fashioned home slide show. Just preselect your images and place in a special folder, then screen share the folder. (Hint: rename your photos with numbers to keep them in desired order.)

Need more time to play or chat? The free version of Zoom only allows 40 minutes for each "meeting" - but when it ends, you can all click on the same link to start it up again. Easy peasy.




