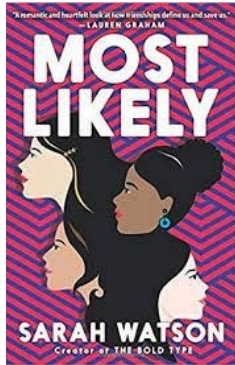

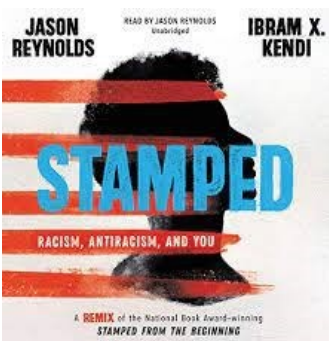

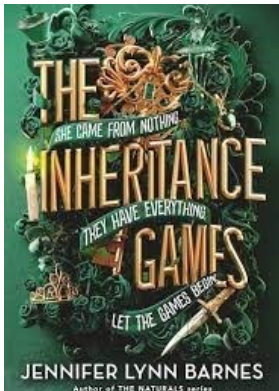

The Isinglass Award promotes teen reading by inviting teens to help select great literature.

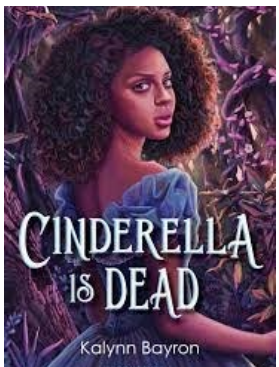
Each year, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders across NH nominate their favorite books and vote on the top 10 in April.

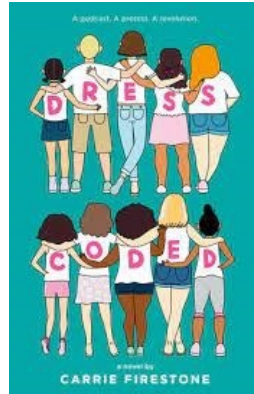

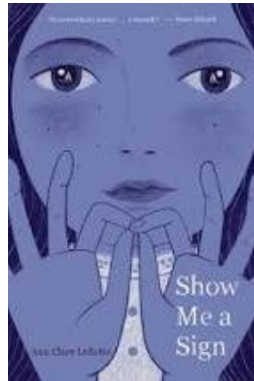
## Dress Coded

## Show Me A Sign



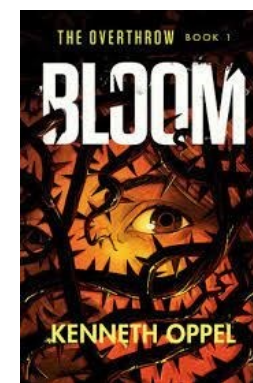

## The Magic Fish



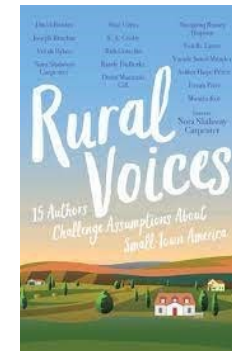
