be hard to recognize wearing a mask!

Visitors will be required to wear masks, sanitize hands, and to keep their visit short. For now, you need to come to the **Depot St.** door and ring the doorbell for entry, so we can be sure to keep numbers in the building to appropriate levels for safe distancing. We will record your name on entry, to enable contact tracing if needed. Staff will all be wearing masks.

In addition to plexiglass, hand sanitizing and masks, the iWave bipolar ionization units installed last September help keep the books and air clear of infectious particles and to keep us all safer.

Doorstep pickup will also still be available.

In and Around Warner

The Library will be closed Saturday July 3, and the Town Offices will be closed Monday July 5, for the Independence Day Holiday.

Warner Historical Society's reading of the Independence day Speech by Frederick Douglass will be at 12:30 pm on Saturday, July 3 on the Town Hall lawn (as Farmer's Market ends).

There was a **3-alarm brush fire** off Route 103 W. at Roby road on Monday afternoon and another at Baker Road in Sutton. If you are going to burn, please remember to get a permit, and it is not a bad idea to alert someone on the Warner Fire Rescue of any plan to burn, even if you have a seasonal permit.

Town Hall has reopened for walk-in business. and committee meetings, using safety protocols. Be aware that most of the Town Hall offices have switched spaces: The Main level is now the Town Administrator and the Assistant to the Selectboard, The Middle level is now the Town Clerk and archives, and the Lower level is the Landuse, Assessing, and Tax Collector offices.

Warner Property Tax payment #1 is due (postmarked) by July 1. Hours are currently Mon-Thurs, 8 am - 3 pm. The Tax Collector's office has moved and is now in the downstairs, just beyond the lower meeting space. You may want to enter through the side door of Town Hall. To drop off payments when closed or without entering, use the mail slot in the wooden front door or US Mail.

Property Tax relief: a single person who owns a home but earned \$20,000 or less in 2020 as well as a married or head of household resident with an adjusted gross income of \$40,000 or less, can apply for property tax relief through the State. Filers need to have been a resident of the home as of April 1, 2020. The deadline to apply is June 30, 2021. The application form (Form DP-8) is available on NHDRA's website or Town Hall. (The library can also print a copy.)

The Board of Selectmen will hold a **Public Hearing** at the Town Hall, Tuesday, July 6, at 7:00 pm on the request to spend up to \$34,000 (Thirty Four Thousand) from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund on an unanticipated **purchase of a John Deer Mowing Tractor**, 6410 4-wheel drive with a 20-foot Boom Mower.

Cool off at "Silver Lake" Town Beach on Bean Road (by North Village Road). http://www.warnerparksandrec.com/silver-lake/ "Wild swimming" with always cool, spring-fed water, a sandy beach, bathroom and changing room, picnic table, and shade if you want it. There is a string across the beach at the water line to keep geese from coming up on the beach - just step over it to swim! (Note that dogs are not permitted on the beach). Formerly the Town Reservoir, the water is dark from minerals and organic tannin, but clean and safe - it is tested every year and never has algae blooms, unlike Elm Brook Park which closed its beach recently for a week due to cyanobacteria:

COVID updates and vaccine info

Current cases of Covid-19 in Warner: 0 <u>active cases</u>, with a total of 203 cases so far, an increase of **zero** from last two week's newsletters. Keep up the good work!

NH's Safer at Home Covid-19 <u>Universal Best Practices</u> effective May 7, 2021.

Although the state of emergency has expired, NH State Epidemiologist, Dr. Benjamin Chan, noted that the pandemic isn't over. The virus is still surging in much of the world, and cases of the more contagious and serious **Delta variant in NH are increasing**.

NH COVID vaccination Information <u>vaccines.nh.gov</u> or call 211. Vaccinations for Covid-19 are FREE, and available for ages 12 and up.

STATE-RUN VACCINATION SITES TO CLOSE soon: In June, all state-run vaccination sites will offer just second doses. Then, on June 30, all of them will close.

The vaccine will still be offered by hospitals, doctor's offices and through local clinics. **CVS locations** throughout New Hampshire are vaccinating eligible individuals. **Walk-ins will be accepted, depending on availability.** But appointments can also be made by registering in advance at CVS.com, through the CVS app, or by calling 800-746-7287. 


How Hot is it, Really?



Show Your Stripes Day was June 21 this year. People worldwide were encouraged to post a "warming stripes" graphic or story showing the temperature changes in their area. The graphics, available to create at https://showyourstripes.info/. were developed by Ed Hawkins at Reading University in the UK. The website takes temperature data for each year on record and compares it to an average of

temperatures from 1970 to 2020. Blue and white colors are cooler, orange to red, warmer. Each stripe represents the temperature in that location averaged over a year. For most countries, the stripes start in the year 1901 and finish in 2020. For New Hampshire, the data starts in 1895. In the USA, NOAA is the data source used.



On Tuesday May 18, the Library Board of Trustees voted to **reopen the library to brief in-person browsing around June 28, 2021, with masks required for now.** The decision is based on low levels of local Covid-19 cases, increasing vaccination levels, and waiting for completion of a **floor refinishing project which is now completed**. The floor project required moving furniture and shelves - and a lot of books and DVDs to put back in place! Thank you for your patience, and do call if you want curbside service or help with copies or online services.


